Mountain Pleasure Horse

The Mountain Pleasure Horse is believed to have descended from the original horses bred in the Appalachians in the mid-1800s. The result of crossings between Spanish horses and eastern stock, the Mountain Pleasure Horse was the original mount of Appalachian farmers. Developed to negotiate the rough mountain trails, Mountain Pleasure Horses are not only sure footed and hardy, but also smoothgoing, with a natural four-beat gait.
